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SAVE OUR STRAYS

Save Our Strays (SOS) is an all volunteer group that assists in advertising the animals available for adoption from Kalamazoo County Animal Services and Enforcement (AS).

The SOS group started in November 2004 through the grass roots and undercover efforts of some then Kalamazoo Animal Rescue volunteers who saw a desperate need for dogs being housed at AS to be listed on the national pet adoption website Petfinder™. Being credited for starting SOS are Kendra and Michael Fisher, Sara Harrison, Cassie Keech, Lauren Kristin, Mary Phillips, JoAnne Powell, and Kathy and Jeremy Winkworth. Their efforts were expanded one year later by Sue Brodasky and Denise Massey, who took on the task of including cats, available for adoption, at AS. Initially the group created a website and began regular photography sessions to post animal pictures nationwide.

While SOS has grown, it still remains a relatively small group and currently has a volunteer base of 10 active members. The work continues to primarily consist of visiting AS once a week to photograph the adoptable animals. The dynamic photos of some very needy cats and dogs are added to the AS animal database software which then automatically uploads all the available information about the animal to Petfinder™.

Even though photography is the primary role, SOS also prides itself on assisting AS whenever there is a need. Previously SOS led fundraising efforts to purchase new mobile cages for the remodeled AS cat room, which allowed cats to be housed in a

room separate from dogs for the first time. Pam Nash, a prior SOS Coordinator designed, solicited talent, and organized painting parties for the animal friendly mural that runs the entire length of the AS kennel facility.

SOS is vital in assisting in the transportation and handling of AS animals to events throughout Kalamazoo County. Organizing adoption events for AS animals at local pet stores, and participating in the Kalamazoo Humane Society's annual Dog Walk. Harding's eScrip Community Card

When you shop at Harding's Friendly Markets you can give to Kalamazoo Animal Rescue at the same time, and at no cost to you. Harding's eScrip Community Card is a program that gives back to the community by making contributions to a group you designate, like KAR.

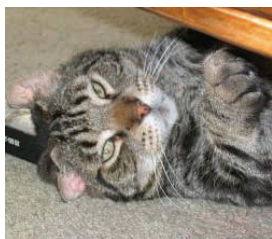
Participation is easy...

- Pick up a personal eScrip Community Card at any Harding's store.
- Register the card by calling 1-800-931-6258 or activate the card online by going to <http://www.escrip.com/merchants/identity/hardings/index.jsp>. During the registration process, select the charity you want to support.
- If you already have an eScrip Card, you can add KAR to the charities you support.

The next time you go shopping at Harding's, show your eScrip card to the cashier during checkout. Harding's calculates the donation to KAR based on a percentage of monthly purchases. Four times a year Harding's sends a donation check to KAR. For the first half of 2009, Kalamazoo Animal Rescue received \$639 and is well on our way of surpassing the \$711 received in 2008. Tresa the Three-Legged Wonder Dog

Tresa was five-months old when I found her at Animal Services. She is a spunky German Shepherd-Labrador Retriever mix that had a painful start in life. Tresa had been in the shelter harboring a broken rear leg for two full weeks! OUCH! I rescued her from the animal shelter and took her to see a veterinarian. Upon examination, the vet deemed that her hind leg wouldn't grow and would be a hindrance to her. So Tresa's left hind leg was amputated.



Many people look at dogs with three legs as "handicapped," but I'm here to tell you that couldn't be farther from the truth. Tresa healed quickly after the surgery and was outrunning most dogs. She went for two-plus mile walks and wanted to keep going. The only reason we stopped was to drop off my other dogs who were tired. Tresa loved going for walks downtown and meeting people. Many people didn't even notice she was missing a leg until she walked away from them and they could see her from behind. Tresa's adaptability was amazing.

CAT'S CORNER

Declawing Cats

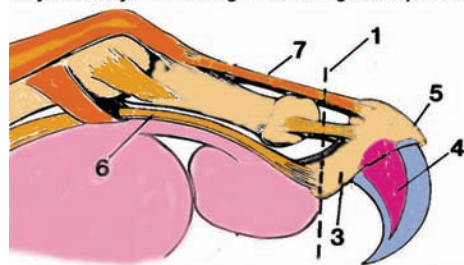
An Onychectomy is also known as "declawing" and is an operation to surgically remove the claws and part of the toes, most often of a household cat. This surgery involves amputating all or part of the distal phalanx, or end bone of the animal's toes.

Declawing is a procedure that should not be undertaken lightly. It is major surgery and can lead to problems, not only for the cat but for the owner too. Prior to considering this procedure it is important to ask your veterinarian pertinent questions to understand potential side effects while keeping your cat's best interests at heart.

Some cat owners believe that declawing their feline will prevent or stop unwanted behavior, such as scratching. Quite often the caregiver is not prepared for the side effects an Onychectomy can cause. Here are some examples:

- Any surgery carries the **risk of being under anesthetic** for extended periods of time. Since declawing is an elective surgery done primarily for the convenience of the owner, this risk should be considered.
- Declawed cats can become **insecure as a result of losing their first line of defense**. To compensate, a cat may become a biter or at the very least shy.
- Due to the painful nature of the surgery, using the litter box can be very uncomfortable for some cats. Owners who have had their beloved pet declawed may **see litter box avoidance**. The trade off is that the owner has saved their treasured items from the cat's claws but they now experience soiled rugs and repugnant odors wafting through the house.
- Some people declaw their animals to prevent a child from being scratched. Generally a cat will only scratch if provoked, so it is very important to teach your child to respect the animals in your household. Learning respect is a more healthy strategy for both the child and the cat in the long run.

CAT'S CORNER (continued)

Here are some helpful tips from [Cats International](#) on how to prevent cats from scratching furniture:

- Get two, **good quality scratching posts** and put them in high traffic areas. The posts should be at least 32" high and sturdy enough not to topple over. They should be covered in "sisal material or rope" and placed in "front of problem areas." The cat should then be praised for good behavior when she uses the post.
- **Trim your cat's claws** regularly.
- **Spraying water** at your feline will discourage unwanted behavior and is often recommended.
- Cats dislike anything sticking to their paws so you can use **double-sided tape** as an inexpensive way to deter the cat.
- Cats also detest perfumes. A good trick is to **place an air freshener** in or around the area where your cat likes to scratch.

Declawing cats has the potential to be a controversial issue. Kalamazoo Animal Rescue strongly urges adoptive families to investigate this elective surgical procedure. To see KAR's Declaw Statement please [click here](#).
