accomplishment such as a graduation or promotion. Contributions are made to KAR in recognition of the honoree's achievement(s).

For an honorary gift, send the following to KAR:

FeLV+ Kitten Happy Tails: Keeley and Kiki

Earlier this year we helped some fellow rescuers with kittens they saved while doing Trap Neuter Release (TNR) work in Kalamazoo. With any new intake, our rescue tests for Feline Leukemia (FeLV) and other contagious diseases at a cost of \$150-180 per cat.

Of the five beautiful three-month old kittens, the tiniest kitty, Keeley, tested FeLV positive. She was immediately separated from the others as this highly infectious disease is spread through bodily fluids in litter boxes and dishes. Keeley went to live in a different foster home and was for the first time in her life, alone. FeLV is



only spread between felines, so Keeley began to enjoy the resident dogs and made friends quickly. She may have been tiny but was not fearful of the dogs that were 20 times her size!

Many rescues would give up hope of finding a FeLV+ kitten a home, but not KAR. We began thinking outside the box and making her illness a positive for potential

owners: Keeley would be a great companion for a family with a dog. We also contacted previous adopters who had given loving homes to other felines with FeLV.

Keeley was fortunate to find a forever home with Liz and two FeLV+ kitties that she adopted from us last year. Sam Sam and Dar Dar both accepted Keeley into their home, allowing their mom (who cooks chicken and scrambled eggs for them each day) to share her attention with this very loving little lady. At night Keeley loves to snuggle with her mom in her bed and by day she chases her brothers up and down the stairs!

Like a scene from the movie *Groundhog Day*, just one week later, Keeley's sister, Kiki, had her second combo test come back FeLV+. A little black kitten with golden eyes was condemned to the same fate: a life of solitude until a forever home was found. The pressure was on once again. Having just contacted all our previous adopters, we knew there was no luck here so we posted great pictures and a video to our website along with her description.

Kiki was just as friendly and loving with people as Keeley. She



was also confident around dogs and her favorite game was to play fetch with them at her foster home! After five weeks of waiting patiently, her family found her. Her new mom said that she "always had a soft spot for the underdog and loved her personality." Kiki was adopted in March to an amazing family who wanted to adopt a cat who needed a chance. Kiki lives with a six-year-old boy and a Rottweiler mix that is about the same age.

KAR would like to thank these special adopters who not only adopted rescued kittens, but ones that comes with challenges that they are willing to face. This reinforces our beliefs that there is a home for every dog and cat out there, and if we are patient we will find them. We will stand by that belief and keep working until there are no homeless animals left to save. Your donations help to keep us going. 🐾

becoming dehydrated during the hot summer months. The same principal applies to our pets, which have just as much need for water as we do. Don't leave your pet without

cool clean water any time of the day, whether indoors or out. In addition to offering plenty of fresh water, be sure to monitor your pet for signs of dehydration including loss of skin elasticity and lethargy. Check for skin elasticity by gently pinching the loose skin in several places to see whether it snaps back into place or stays in the "pinched" position, which is a sign of dehydration. If you have any doubts about your pet's condition, be sure to

consult your veterinary health care professional for advice.

Food: Pets need access to food that is safe from spoilage during the day. If you serve canned food during hot weather, only leave it out for a short time so that it can't spoil and cause illness. Dry food is more heat stable and safer to leave out if you will be gone for several hours.

Shade/Shelter: If you give your cat or dog access to the outdoors, you need to provide shade and shelter to avoid heat-related illnesses. For canines, an enclosed backyard with a dog house or other shaded shelter can be a safe environment as long as water and food are also available, and as long as you don't leave your dog unsupervised for long periods of time. Cats can be kept safe with an enclosure or "catio" (cat patio) or even a tie out harness for short periods of time. Felines can easily

jump any fence so letting your cat outside to run loose is not recommended. As with dogs, cats in safe enclosures should have access to food and water and plenty of shade.

Supervision: Your pet may be the apple of your eye but a roaming cat or dog can be exposed to danger from other animals or people. Supervision of your pet when outdoors and restriction of their movement to a small area is essential for keeping them safe.

Our furry friends can share our love for being outdoors in the summer months as long as we provide for their needs. Be sure to keep your pals safe to ensure a long and happy life together! 🐾
